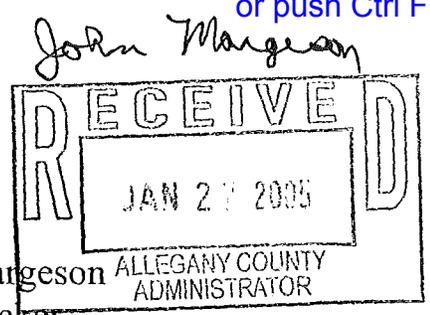

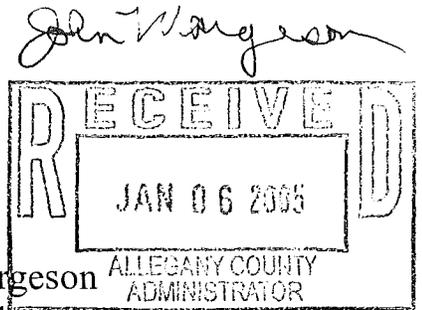

Chairman Reynolds asked for some discussion on the matter of the Court House and the State Court system's requirements in addressing additional space needs.

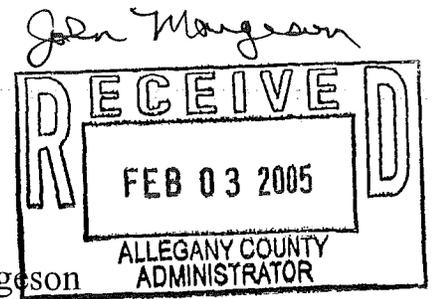
Some options discussed were building an additional facility or to have some current departments move out of the Court House area. It was suggested that whatever determination is made it should be cost effective.

The initial cost to start the program will be from out of the Homeland Security Grant Program. There will be a reoccurring annual fee to maintain the system and additional charges would be made for the individual phone calls, when made.

Chairman Reynolds called on John Tucker, Director, for his report. John noted that he would like to request approval to apply for the Homeland Security Grant called the State Homeland Security Program (SHSP). The grant totals \$50,000 for Allegany County.

Legislature, Pataki agree on tougher DWI proposal

ALBANY -- Because of a grieving mother's relentless lobbying of Albany, a tougher proposal for fatal drunken drivers that would be called VaSean's Law gained the support of the Legislature and Gov. George Pataki on Monday.

The bill expected to be passed Monday in the Assembly and in the Senate in coming days makes a felony of seriously injuring or killing a person while driving drunk. The bill would remove a difficult obstacle in the current law that requires a prosecutor to prove negligence _ a missed stop light or other violation _ in addition to drunk driving.

The bill is named for 11-year-old VaSean Phillip Allenyne who was killed last year in a crash in which the driver was accused of driving drunk. VaSean's 12-year-old friend, Angel Reyes, was critically injured in the Queens crash.

The driver faces a misdemeanor and if convicted would face no more than a year in j

If the proposal is passed, a driver convicted of driving while intoxicated in a crash that seriously hurt or killed a person could face up seven years in prison.

Pataki referred to the accident as "murder," although he said he was speaking as a father and not as a governor or lawyer. The case is still pending against the driver.

Assembly Speaker Sheldon Silver, a Manhattan Democrat, and Republican Senate Majority Leader Joseph Bruno of Rensselaer County said their chambers would pass the same law. Pataki said he would sign it, and would support accelerating its effective date now set at Nov. 1.

The agreement announced Monday followed six weeks of often emotional lobbying by VaSean's mother, Monique Dixon. Silver, Bruno and Pataki all credited Dixon.

WHEREAS, the President in Homeland Security Directive (HSPD)-5, directed the Secretary of the Department of Homeland Security to develop and administer a National Incident management System which would provide a consistent nationwide approach for Federal, State, local, and tribal governments to work together more effectively and efficiently to prepare for, prevent, respond to, and recover from domestic incidents, regardless of cause, size, or complexity;

WHEREAS, to facilitate the most efficient and effective incident management it is critical that Federal, State, local, and tribal organizations utilize standardized terminology, standardized organizational structures, interoperable communications, consolidated action plans, unified command structures, uniform personnel qualification standards, uniform standards for planning, training, and exercising, comprehensive resource management, and designated incident facilities during emergencies or disasters;

WHEREAS, the NIMS standardized procedures for managing personnel, communications, facilities and resources will improve the ability to utilize federal funding to enhance local and state agency readiness, maintain first responder safety, and streamline incident management processes;

WHEREAS, the Incident Command System components of NIMS are already an integral part of various incident management activities throughout the State, including current emergency management training programs; and

WHEREAS, the National Commission on Terrorist Attacks (9-11 Commission) recommended adoption of a standardized Incident Command System;

RE: Restoration of Assistant District Attorney Position

A resolution is requested to restore the position of 4th Assistant District Attorney in the office of the District Attorney for Allegany County. This would be a confidential position, and would restore the position eliminated in 2003.

Most counties in the state have suffered from dramatic increases in criminal activity and the resulting caseload in the District Attorney's Offices. Allegany County has been no exception. A review of the past 20 years' activity can quickly illustrate the current need for additional prosecution resources.

In 1984, the Annual Report for the then newly incoming District Attorney reflected a total of 845 new case files opened by the office during the calendar year. That caseload was divided between a full time District Attorney and two part time assistant District Attorneys (Effectively 2 Full time Equivalents, or FTEs). By 1988, the caseload had increased to 1436 cases, prompting the District Attorney to request, and the Legislature to grant, a Third assistant position, making a total of 4 prosecutors (but only 2 ½ FTEs). Caseloads continued to increase, and in 1990 reached 1732 case files, prompting the addition of a 4th Assistant (making 3 FTEs). In 1997, grant money from the Violence against Women Act allowed for a temporary increase of one part time ADA to full time, but that full time position reverted to part time on the expiration of the funding in 2001.

By 2003, the caseload had reached 2194 files for the year, but budget constraints compelled the legislature to REDUCE the prosecution staff from the 4 assistant slots to 3 (The same staff as in 1990). Burdens on individual prosecutors have consequently increased to levels considered unsustainable. As an illustration, in 1984, 845 total cases were divided among 3 prosecutors; In 2004, one prosecutor alone was assigned 848, with another handling 782! Caseloads again increased in 2004, reaching a record total of 2,546 for the year, (47% higher than 1990) prompting this request for restoration of previously withdrawn resources.

Any other steps available to the office to ameliorate the impact of the continually increasing workload and reduction of resources have already been taken. These include increased automation, efficient scheduling, and the shifting of responsibilities to non-prosecution staff to the extent legally permissible. But the size of the County, the number of justice courts, and the number of court appearances cannot be reduced. Added to the increase in caseload, the result has been a reduction of the prosecutor time devoted to each case, with predictable results. The District Attorney's office has been forced into a "triage" situation, where only high profile or serious case can receive appropriate attention. This is an intolerable situation, and totally unacceptable to concerned victim advocates and community groups.

As an additional concern, the responsibilities placed upon the District Attorney's office have also increased over the past 20 years. Beginning with the increased emphasis on DWI prosecutions by the state, and the increasing penalties, lowered blood alcohol threshold and civil and license consequences, "routine" DWI tickets now are vigorously contested, requiring more prosecution time and effort. Domestic Violence prosecution has also become a specialty, and due to the nature of the crime, one requiring relatively intensive attention from the prosecutor. Sex offenses, especially against children, are grueling in the amount of work required to bring an offender to justice, and are much more readily reported today than in the past. And sex offenders are now required to register under the state's "Megan's Law," with additional contested hearings required. The growing numbers of arrests for illegal drugs also foreshadows the need for increasing resources to counteract the attendant problems which result.

Additional changes in society's demands over the past 20 years could be cited, but the bottom line is that the office is today expected to do more, with fewer resources, than at any time in the last 20 years. It is a credit to the dedication of the current Assistant DAs that they have continued to serve, as part-time, in an environment which exacts such a toll on their private practice and personal lives.

Lest some believe that the situation is the same all over the state, I refer the legislature again to the 2003 survey of DAs in western New York, and to staffing and compensation levels of counties in the region comparable to ours. Wyoming County, with FEWER people, and SMALLER geographical footprint, has THREE FULL TIME assistant DAs. Livingston County, with a slightly larger population and smaller geographical footprint has three full time AND two part time Assistant DAs. Cattaraugus, with a larger population and equivalent geographical footprint, has three full time and two part time Assistant DAs. Outside the region, Cortland

County, often used as a comparison to Allegany due to being the same population size (but which has a smaller geographic area) has SIX assistant DAs!

In summary, the foregoing information documents that the County needs additional resources restored to the District Attorney's office to maintain adequate prosecution standards. We have always prided ourselves in the past on maintaining a safe and secure community for the residents of Allegany County, and not devolving into the "turnstile justice" of more urban areas, with the "slap on the wrist" treatment of offenders. Unfortunately, continued denial of needed resources may result in not being able to have that pride in the future.

Funds from state and local forfeitures and other sources must not be commingled with federal equitable sharing funds. The recipient agency shall establish a separate revenue account or accounting code for state, local, Department of Justice, and Department of the Treasury forfeiture funds. Interest income generated must be accounted for in the appropriate federal forfeiture fund account.

The parties agree that such accounting will be subject to the standard accounting requirements and practices employed for other public monies as supplemented by requirements set forth in the current edition of the Department of Justice's *A Guide to Equitable Sharing of Federally Forfeited Property for State and Local Law Enforcement Agencies (Justice Guide)*, and the Department of the Treasury's *Guide to Equitable Sharing for Foreign Countries and Federal, State, and Local Law Enforcement Agencies (Treasury Guide)*. The accounting of shared funds must be reported on the Annual Certification Report.

The misuse or misapplication of shared resources or the supplantation of existing resources with shared assets is prohibited. Failure to comply with any provision of this agreement shall subject the recipient agency to the sanctions stipulated in the current edition of the *Justice or Treasury Guides*, depending on the source of the funds or property.

6. Federal Annual Certification Report. The recipient agency shall submit an Annual Certification Report to the Department of Justice and the Department of the Treasury (at the addresses shown in item 1) and a copy to the U.S. Attorney in the district in which the recipient agency is located. The certification must be submitted in accordance with the instructions received from the respective departments or as outlined in the *Justice or Treasury Guides*. Receipt of the certification report is a prerequisite to receiving any equitably shared cash, property, or proceeds.
